- How has The Guardians of the Waters Program impacted you? What are the important lessons you received and in what ways are you implementing them?
- Where does your ancestral knowledge and spirit live and how do you activate it? How do you preserve, restore and defend the sacred?
- During these times of socio-political, cultural and environmental crisis, what are the gifts that you and your communities bring that contribute to making the world a better place for us and future generations?

**Exhibition Dates:** March 30 to April 28, 2019.

**Submission Deadline: Submit your work by February 15, 2019.** You will be able to sell your work. 100% of proceeds go to the artist.

**Community Event and Celebration:** We will have a community event and celebration on **Saturday, April 6** with performances and workshops. We invite you to perform and lead a workshop.
